Cultivating Reading Apprenticeship in the Classroom and Beyond

Reading Apprenticeship is an instructional framework which helps teachers support students across the disciplines and levels to become motivated, strategic, and critical thinkers, and writers, to develop positive literacy identities, and to engage with challenging academic texts.

Supporting Students Who Experience Food and Housing Insecurities

In this session, presenters will highlight patterns of food and housing insecurities that were collected via the Community College Success Measure. The presenters will highlight salient shared characteristics of students in the sample who experience food and housing insecurities, as well as how these challenges influence non-cognitive and student success outcomes. These insights will be bolstered by qualitative data that were gathered by way of focus groups with male students of color. Strategies that can be employed by faculty, staff, and administrators to support students who experience food and housing insecurities will be presented.

The Effects of Implicit Bias on Student Success

This workshop will focus on implicit bias and its influence on student success for underserved students. The presenter will discuss how early socialization experiences reify assumptions, stereotypes, and misconceptions about students from diverse backgrounds and impact the ways in which educators teach and serve them. Strategies for recognizing implicit biases and reducing their impact will also be discussed.
